# Official Notice of Capital Credits Retirement

**IN SEPTEMBER**, the Hamilton County Electric Cooperative Board of Directors voted to retire \$2,917,393 in capital credits owed to its members for the years 1989–96. Members who had electric service for one or more years within this period will be eligible for a return.

Returns exceeding \$50 will be distributed via check in late December. Active members receiving a return of less than \$50 will see the amount credited on their billing statement in early January 2025. Inactive members will receive a capital credits check regardless of the amount.

This article is intended to serve as the official notice of the retirement of capital credits for 1989–96. ■

# Official Notice of Capital Credits Allocations

**HAMILTON COUNTY ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE** recently allocated capital credits to its members for 2023.

At the end of each fiscal year, cooperatives determine the margins made during the year by deducting the expense of operating the cooperative from the revenue received from the sale of electricity. These margins are then allocated to each member's account based on their electric use. Once these margins are allocated, they are referred to as capital credits.



Capital credits remain invested in the cooperative until the co-op's board of directors determines that a retirement would not weaken the cooperative financially. To date, Hamilton County EC has retired \$4,749,372.68 of its capital credits obligations for the years 1947–88.

It's very important that departing members keep the cooperative informed of their current mailing addresses so they can receive capital credits when they're returned.

Members can calculate their capital credits for 2023

by multiplying the sum of their electric service bills for 2023 by 0.0703. For example, if the year-end total of your electric bills from the cooperative was \$1,000, simply multiply that amount by 0.0703, and the result is \$70.30—your capital credits allocation for 2023. In calculating your total bill, do not include any sales tax, miscellaneous charges, membership fees or deposits.

If you have any questions concerning your capital credits account, feel free to contact Hamilton County EC.

# Hamilton County EC Celebrates 85th Membership Meeting

**HAMILTON COUNTY ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE** held its 85th annual meeting October 1 at the Circle T Arena at 4007 State Highway 36 in Hamilton.

The co-op's board of directors and employees welcomed a record 535 registered members and their guests to the arena. Member attendance was up more than 50 from last year.

Attendees' first stop was registration, where co-op employees gave each member a warm welcome, a \$25 Walmart gift card and entered their registration cards for the prize drawings.

Circle T Arena's Crossfire Steakhouse and Cantina provided a mouthwatering buffet-style dinner of grilled chicken breast, fried catfish, shrimp, barbecue brisket and sausage, various sides, and cobbler for dessert for more than 1,200 people.

Robert Straley, HCEC board president, welcomed everyone at 7 p.m. and called the meeting to order. Dane Barron, pastor of First Baptist Church of Evant and an HCEC journeyman lineman, delivered the invocation. Alicia Straley performed the national anthem and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Cody Lasater, HCEC general manager, thanked everyone who helped with the meeting, including John Sally, Mary Hankins and Donna Harris. He also extended thanks to the co-ops and companies that donated prizes for the drawings. Lasater recognized HCEC employees for "their unwavering commitment and hard work, which were crucial to the success of this meeting."

Finally, Lasater acknowledged HCEC member-owners.

"We are thankful for the privilege of serving such a distinguished group of owners, who demonstrate a deep appreciation for the challenges inherent in maintaining a reliable power supply," Lasater said. "Your steadfast support is greatly appreciated, and we are here to assist you should any concerns arise."

Lasater then called on Straley for his remarks.

"We still live in a country where we are free to assemble, eat together, pray together, sing the national anthem and recite the Pledge of Allegiance," Straley said. He asked servicemen and women and first responders in the crowd to stand and be recog-









nized, affirming that, "they are the reason we continue to have our liberties."

Straley reminded the attendees of severe weather earlier this spring, when many members experienced outages.

"There were linemen and office personnel who did not go home for over 40 hours," he said. "The dedication and work ethic of the personnel of HCEC is second to none. They truly live by the motto 'Owned by those we serve.'"

Straley named each employee and asked them to stand for a round of well-deserved applause.

Gregg Belcher, HCEC foreman and winner of Texas Electric Cooperatives' Unsung Hero Award, was in attendance. The award is given to those in TEC's loss control program who go above and beyond in regards to safety, training and education. Belcher was unanimously nominated for the award. Straley asked him to stand to be congratulated.

Members learned that HCEC has achieved over 38,167 manhours, or 138 days, without a lost-time accident—a testament to the commitment to safety by HCEC employees and George Luker, safety coordinator.

A new outage management system was introduced last month, which makes reporting outages more efficient.

"We understand the challenges faced during extensive outages, particularly the difficulty in reaching a dispatcher and the lengthy hold times," Straley said.

With the new system, members have more options to report outages. They can call the new number or use the SmartHub web portal or the SmartHub app. Members who use SmartHub can also take advantage of billing and payment options, alert and notification control, paperless billing, usage monitoring, and inquiry submission.

To register for SmartHub, have your billing account number handy and visit hamiltonelectric.coop.

In his closing remarks, Straley thanked the management and the board of directors at HCEC for the job they do and the members for allowing him to serve on the board. "It truly is an honor," he said.

The meeting's business portion featured the results of the election of directors by a quorum of members voting by mail.

This year, 1,088 members voted. Bob Lilly of the law firm Carpenter & Croft declared that Dusty Duncan, District 5, and Brandon Haile, District 2, were reelected to three-year terms.

After the business portion of the meeting, the prize drawings began. The grand prize was once again a \$1,000 HCEC bill credit. Copperas Cove resident Thomas Parker was the lucky winner. An additional 85 prizes were awarded to members in attendance.





# Caulking: A Simple Solution to Winter Drafts

IT'S PRETTY EASY to keep drafts out of the house on cold and windy days: Simply seal your windows by caulking around them.

All you need is caulk and a caulk gun, which you can easily find at any home or hardware store. To make the task go faster, share caulking duties with your children. Here's what to do:

- **1.** To get started, clean the window, sill, trim and frame with a damp cloth. Allow everything to dry.
- **2.** Scrape old caulk and any peeling paint off the window and the area immediately surrounding it.
- **3.** Using the caulk gun, apply the caulk between the window frame and siding on the outdoors. Indoors, fill in the gap between the windows and the trim. Don't over-apply or the caulk can look messy.
- **4.** Depending on the age of your window, the caulk that holds the glass panes in place may also need replacing or repair.

For extra protection, add weatherstripping around doors and windows. If cold air enters the house below the door, get a draft blocker or simply roll up a bath towel and set it in front of the door to block the breeze.

# New Program Offers Convenience for Members

**HAMILTON COUNTY** Electric Cooperative has implemented a new outage management system, which makes the process of reporting outages significantly easier.

We understand the challenges faced during extensive outages, particularly the difficulty in reaching a dispatcher and the lengthy hold times. Now outages can be reported simply by calling the new OMS phone number or by using the SmartHub web portal or SmartHub app.

# To make a payment or report an outage via the OMS phone line, call 1-855-955-3183 and follow the appropriate prompts.

If the caller ID corresponds to the phone number linked to your account in our records, the outage will be reported automatically.

If the caller ID does not correspond to the phone number linked to your account in our records, you will be required to provide either the phone number on file or the account number related to the outage.

With the SmartHub web portal and mobile app, you can

effectively manage your electric service account.

# Some of the advantages include:

**Billing and payments:** Access your billing any time from anywhere and save time with easy payment options. Set up auto pay or make payments via credit card or checking. No fees!

Alerts and notifications: Stay informed on important information regarding your account status or real-time information regarding outages via email or text messages.

**Paperless billing:** Activate SmartHub paperless billing, an eco-friendly way to access your bill instantly.

**Usage monitoring:** Monitor your usage daily and track your habits. Compare usage trends to previous bills.

## Report outages: Avoid those

long hold times during large outages and set notifications to receive a text, email or a phone call when there's an update to your outage. You can also utilize the Track Issue Status link under Contact Us and determine if your outage was restored while not at home.

**Submit inquiries:** Instantly send inquiries for anything from address changes to tree trimming.

SmartHub is designed to empower you with complete control

over your account, providing the necessary tools to deliver timely information that aids in making informed decisions regarding your account.

### To register for SmartHub, you will need:


- ▶ Your billing account number

To register, visit hamiltonelectric.coop and then click the SmartHub icon to register as a new user. After completing the registration and logging in to your SmartHub account, navigate to Settings and Manage Notifications to enable text messaging.

You may also set up notifications under the Billing, Miscellaneous and Service menus.

Additionally, you have the option to download the app to your smartphone. In your app store, search for the SmartHub app, which is represented by the green icon pictured below.

Once the app is installed, look for Hamilton and log in using your existing credentials or create a new account by entering your email and account number. To report an outage through the SmartHub mobile app, tap Report an Issue/Inquiry.



To report an outage through the SmartHub web portal, find the link on the home page of our website. Once you log in to SmartHub, click the Report Power Outage link located in the menu options on the left of the screen.

An outage map on our website, hamiltonelectric.coop, is another new feature of the new outage system.
